
Library Programs and Services:

This month the library proudly kicked off a series of American Creed programs. Holly Hibner implemented this grant with the assistance of intern Ellen Gleason. In conjunction with the American Library Association, the Plymouth District Library

hosted a series of programs focusing on America and the PBS

documentary, *American Creed*. In the 2018 documentary, former US Secretary of State, Condoleezza Rice and Pulitzer Prize-winning historian David Kennedy come together from different points of view to investigate the idea of a unifying American creed. Their spirited inquiry frames the stories of citizen-activists striving to realize their own visions of America's promise across deepening divides. At the heart of this film, Rice and Kennedy lead a moving discussion with first generation college students about the question: what does it mean to be American today?

ALA's Office of Public Programming, in partnership with Citizen Film and the National Writing Project, made this available to libraries across the country. They invited public libraries to host community



conversations; only 50 public libraries were selected. The Plymouth District Library saw this program as an opportunity to further the library's mission "to connect, enrich, and improve lives through information, services, and spaces." Library Director, Carol Souchock further explained, "The library is the right place to have these types of heartfelt discussions, to learn more about our neighbor and ask questions in a safe, open environment." We kicked our American Creed series off on April 13 with a showing of the film which was supported by a discussion lead by Dr. Stephen Berrey from The University of Michigan. The second event was a panel discussion with community leaders which addressed "What every American should know." Panelists include:

- Steve Spreitzer, President & CEO of the Michigan Roundtable for Diversity and Inclusion
- Nick Brandon, Executive Director of Marketing and Communications, Plymouth-Canton Community Schools
- Osama Odeh, Male Youth Director, Muslim Community of the Western Suburbs of Detroit
- Sgt. Stephanie J. Shannon, Founder/CEO, Michigan Women Veterans Empowerment and Author/Speaker/Veterans Advocate at www.battlingthestormwithin.com

These events were very well received. Participation was strong and the discussions were stimulating. Many of those attended thanked our staff for providing this opportunity for civil and civic engagement.

We had scheduled a program on Michigan POW Camps earlier this year that had to be rescheduled due to extreme weather conditions. Guest speaker, and author, Greg Sumner a professor of history from the University of Detroit Mercy presented in late April with over a 100 people in attendance.


Building and Technology Updates:

The transformation of our computer lab started this month as we moved forward with the implementation of our new printers and coin op. This project was generously funded by our State of Michigan appropriation. We will be offering wireless printing throughout the library and the opportunity for patrons to pay for print jobs using charge and debit cards. Both of these services are in great demand. This project utilizes new software which we are trialing in the lab. Once lab installation is complete we will be training staff on these new services. This will be followed by opening up use for the public. In addition the lab will soon offer poster printing. Once these services go live we will then move forward with the next step which upgrades the lab, and selected staff computers, with the Adobe Creative Cloud software suite.

In April our SirsiDynix server migration took place under the leadership of Technical Services Coordinator Katie Page. This project helps stabilize and modernize our library catalog infrastructure.

Director's Activities:

This month I represented the library at a number of important community events. The library's partnership with the Salvation Army, which brings children from the SA summer camp to the library



to participate in our summer reading program, was recognized at the United Ways annual meeting. Along with Community Relation Specialist Susan Stoney I hosted a table at the Plymouth Chamber Showcase/Taste of Plymouth event. We also worked with Mary Kelly, our digital services and emerging technologies librarian to present on business resources ReferenceUSA and Lynda.com at a Chamber workshop. We appreciate these opportunities to engage with community members outside of the library. I also attended a MLA (Michigan Library Association) HR workshop in Rochester, MI.

KidLitCon Providence 2019 – *Reaching Readers*

Report by Katy Kramp



Thank you very much to PDL for sending me to KidLitCon in Providence on March 22 and 23, 2019. KidLitCon is a tiny conference organized by book bloggers, which does a great job of connecting gatekeepers like librarians and bloggers with authors and illustrators to talk about the big issues that concern all of us. This was my third KidLitCon, and I would not have been able to attend without the support of the Library. Thank you also to Charlotte of Charlotte's Library and her team for organizing the conference and letting me be part of it.

Friday LeUyen Pham

Friday's session opened with a speech from award-winning illustrator

extraordinaire LeUyen Pham, illustrated with her drawings of herself growing up as well as pictures from her many books (we have 55 of her books in our collection.) LeUyen came to the US from Vietnam as a toddler, and spoke of the challenges of growing up as an immigrant, and how she bonded with books because they helped her understand the culture risk-free.

LeUyen has always drawn diverse groups of children in her illustrations, just to reflect her world. But she feels that all divisions end if the story rings true and we can see to the person inside. The new culture of regulating the diversity is difficult even if the diversity push is needed. A specific example is that she will now be told how many people of any given ethnicity to include in a group, and told not to have any two of the same next to each

other. She asks, Can we still tell good stories and help create positive change within the new guidelines.

How to Take Great Photos of Books and Grow Instagram Followers With Charnaie Gordon @hereweeread and Lauren Neil @picturebookplaydate

Two successful Bookstagramers (with 41.8K and 7.4K followers respectively) talked about Instagram strategies for book people.

- Taking a good picture make it eye catching and high quality, up close. Use natural light. Fancy props aren't necessary. They swear by a sheet of white posterboard for getting a nice clean background, and don't use the fancy filters.
- Show up and engage to grow your followers! Use stories, and post often.
- Charnaie uses the Planoly app to plan and organize her posts, so that they can appear regularly even when she's busy with other things.

Not Just the Newbery – All about Awards and Best Book Lists With Shoshana Flax, Anamaria Anderson, and Charlotte Taylor

Panelists talked about awards they've worked on that aren't the major ALA awards. Shoshana works at Horn Book and is familiar with their lists, as well as serving on the committee for the Sydney Taylor Award. Anamaria has worked on the Batchelder Award, as well as the U.S. Board on Books for Young People, both focusing on international books available in the U.S. Charlotte has been involved in the Cybils Awards for a long time. All of these awards can help raise awareness of worthy books outside the mainstream.

Keynote - Varian Johnson – If It Were Easy, Everyone Would Do It

Varian Johnson is the award-winning author of many books for kids and teens. I've read the four most recent, including last year's Coretta Scott King honor book, *The Parker Inheritance*. He was coming straight off another trip and getting sick, but did his best anyway, giving writing tips based on his career, as well as sharing his social media philosophy. This boils down to "You don't always have to share your opinion. Think about who you might be silencing." Other gems include

- Give yourself a chance
- Do the work
- Set a schedule
- Show up even when the muse doesn't
- Have a support group
- Find the thing that ignites your passion

Diverse Fantasy in the Real World

With Rajani LaRocca, Anna Meriano, and Zetta Elliott, moderated by S.R. Toliver

This is my dream session! Stephanie Toliver, the moderator, is a Ph.D. student in YA literature,

specifically looking at the treatment of people of color in these books, and working at bringing fantasy books to young women of color.

Rajani's thoughts – we can all be magical in different and also strikingly similar ways. Her book aims to normalize things, specifically about Indian-American culture, that are usually exoticized.

Zetta says that fantasy is a way to help children negotiate trauma because magic is power. A disadvantage is that people want books for Black children to be Brussels sprouts, not fantasy adventures.

We need to avoid monolithic views of cultures.

General discussion about the article that started the whole discussion of books as windows and mirrors is that we need to remember that books shouldn't be one or the other, but sliding glass doors – every book should be both a window and a mirror to the reader.

The Illustrated Middle Grade

With Christopher Denise, illustrator, and Chris Tebetts, author, moderated by Anamaria Anderson

Chris Tebetts works with James Patterson on his Middle Grade series. He shared his very visual, film school graduate way of looking at writing. Christopher Denise is an illustrator – I'm most familiar with *Firefly Hollow*. In general, illustrating is a dance with the author leading. Don't let the illustrations bog down the narrative!

This session had five authors with books for middle grade students on lots of tough topics, including domestic and gun violence, being molested by an adult, racism, becoming homeless and more. Authors talked about why they feel it's important to talk about these issues, their relationships with them, and how they structure the books so the heavy topics aren't overwhelming. I took no notes because I was moderating, but it was a really good conversation.

Reaching Readers Part II: the Gatekeepers

This was a big ol' talk on reader's advisory, including good questions to ask readers, easy display and book promotion ideas. Best new question for me: "Who are you seeing in the mirror?" And, a whiteboard for kids to fill out with sentence beginnings like "When I'm sad, I want to read..."

The Frightful Fantastic

This session brought together three authors of scary books for children and one Ph.D. student, moderated by a librarian. They set out to discuss why kids like scary books, how much scary is too scary, and how gatekeepers can help them find the right books. It was a lively conversation with lots of back-and-forth and laughter. David started out by saying that he thinks kids today like scary books because their lives are too safe. Stephanie reads such books with kids who've been in horrible situations — refugees, homeless, etc. — and says that even when their lives aren't safe, kids want the difference of fantasy danger, and the hope of meaning and maybe a happy ending. Paula notes that in her experience, kids are really good at knowing what's too scary for them.

This is a short summary – I have more extensive notes, specifically on the Instagram and Reaching Readers panels.

This is a wonderful conference, which rotates around the country. I am looking into running it in Ann Arbor next year, with help from former PDL intern Nakenya Lewis-Yarbrough and Ann Arbor school librarian Maggi Rohde.

Technology

Early this month, we migrated to a new Windows server for our integrated library system, Symphony. This project was mostly handled remotely by our ILS vendor, SirsiDynix. The process went very smoothly, and we were back online on the new server by early afternoon.

Downloads of our mobile app continue to increase week by week. Mary Kelly will have the full mobile app statistics in her reports every month, but we are nearing 500 users, and feedback from patrons has been very positive.

Statistics

Our technical services staff cataloged and processed 1,591 items new to our collection and placed 105 purchase orders in the month of April. Our circulation staff registered 257 new patrons.

For MeL interlibrary loan, we sent 1,726 items to other libraries, and received 1,143 items for our own patrons.
