

Library Celebrates Centennial

SERVING THE PLYMOUTH COMMUNITY 1923-2023

Twenty twenty-three marks the 100th anniversary of the founding of our beloved library!



A library station was hosted in the home of "Mrs. Albert Griffin of Canton Center", starting in 1921. As caretaker of that personal library, Mrs. Griffin used to tell stories of the patrons who used her collection, including immigrant families who were able to find books in their native language.

As the community grew, so did support for an *official* library. This first public library in Plymouth was founded in 1923 by a group of influential women who donated all of the books and furnishings for the space. This library operated out of Plymouth Village Hall as a branch of the Wayne County Library System. In 1981, the Library was re-organized as a department of the City of Plymouth, with contractual arrangements to continue to serve Plymouth and Canton Townships, and just four years later, voters created a Library District to include the City of Plymouth and Plymouth Township, with Canton opting to break off on its own.

The library grew exponentially throughout the past 100 years, requiring regular expansion of the buildings it occupied, until our current home was built in 1990's. Generous donations from community members made many of these expansions a possibility. donate it to the City of Plymouth. It also includes the Edward C. Hough and Mary Hough Kimball Foundation, which in 1957 donated the funds to replace this building with a new 6000 sq. ft. structure, subsequently named the Dunning-Hough Library. 
DETROIT PUBLISHING COMPANY -**POSTCARDS AND PRINTS**

Presented by Don Batkins. Originally founded as the Detroit Photographic Company in 1885, it was renamed the Detroit Publishing Company (DPC) in 1905. For a time DPC was a major producer of postcards in the U.S. This talk illustrates how black & white photographs were turned into color postcards. A brief guide for dating postcards is also included. Today DPC postcards are widely collected and highly prized. The talk concludes with examples of images taken by DPC photographers.
