

Library Visits



We continue to work on implementing the new email marketing platform to replace Constant Contact. This platform will utilize catalog data to help patrons receive more relevant information about library services and collections.



Updates in The Lab

With a new staff member, Lily Fronden, supporting The Lab, we are in a good position to increase availability and programming with STEM tools. To support this, we will be taking on a small redesign of the space, that will accommodate our new sewing machines as well as the new laser cutter. The poster printer will be moved to a public area of the building to support increased awareness of the service.

BOCSH Community Fund Grant

PDL was once again awarded with a grant from the BOSCH Community Fund. This grant will pay for community-wide access to LinkedIn Learning, Creativebug, and Lerner Maker Lab. It will also pay for us to hire 4 (out of 5 total) high school students who will support The Lab with extended hours and programming throughout the summer. The grant totals \$17,500. Applications are currently online for the positions and we have received a positive response from the community.
