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





Mobile App

On the evening of November 26, the library's mobile application went down due to a vendor conflict between Sirsi-Dynex (the operator of the library's ILS catalog) and Solus (Sirsi's contracted app operator for the BCMobile product PDL subscribed to). Solus pulled a significant portion of code from the app, rendering the application useless. Sirsi is unable to support the application without Solus, therefore all libraries currently subscribed to BCMobile lost their app.

PDL is currently in the process of determining a new vendor for our mobile application, but implementation is likely to take multiple months, due to the oversaturated market of libraries looking for a replacement. My goal is to have a new application up and running by March.

Amphitheater Construction

Hardscape construction was completed and we are now waiting until the spring for planting. Programming will also be planned for the space—for a grand opening and additional programs throughout the warm weather months.

Ongoing Elevator Issues

Over the past few months, we have had to bring out multiple repair crews to look at the staff elevator, which has been restarting itself multiple times throughout the day, unprompted. We are considering the replacement of the door sensors on both sides of the elevator as a preliminary measure, as technicians have been unable to diagnose the issue definitively. Replacement of the full doors is also an option, but I am hoping that we can mitigate this with our initial sensor project.

Additionally, we recently learned that more upgrades will be needed in the coming years to bring our elevators up to new code standards before 2028. This will require at least \$45,000 to implement. I am instead hoping that we can make it to 2026 for a full elevator replacement that would satisfy the new code mandates.

Wellness Room

Construction is ongoing for the new Wellness Room in the youth services department. The old copy nook is being walled off and a door will be added. This will provide much needed private space for nursing parents and individuals with sensory needs. This will be completed and paid for before the end of the fiscal year.
