
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

CIRCULATION

PHYSICAL COLLECTIONS

Circulation for the year broke half a million for a total of 574,960. On average, about 16 physical items were checked out per person in our district. When combined with digital checkouts, our per capita average climbs to 20.





DIGITAL COLLECTIONS

eResource usage increased by 11% over the previous month.
Database usage decreased, despite the additional subscriptions added. Overall, the 2023 monthly average for eResources increased 14% over the previous year's monthly average, while the monthly average for databases decreased by 10% over the prior year.



Mobile App

PDL has elected to go with Capira for our next mobile application. It offers more functionality than our old app and is very easy to use. We are waiting on SIRSI to finalize configuring connections for the Capira API. We remain hopeful at having a new app up and running by March.

New Embroidery Machine

The new Baby Lock Capella embroidery machine that the Board approved has arrived. We will be acquiring a few more peripherals to make it easier to embroider hats and t-shirts before making it available to the public. Lily Fronden has received some training and is in the process of training other staff on how to use the new equipment.

New Receipt Printers

We replaced receipt printers at all the service desks and installed some more receipt printers to make printing guest passes for the new print/computer management system easier
