

eResource usage increased by 11% over the previous month.

Database usage decreased, despite the additional subscriptions added. Overall, the 2023 monthly average for eResources increased 14% over the previous year's monthly average, while the monthly average for databases decreased by 10% over the prior year.





In January, the IT team welcomed Clint Lafferty to support in-house computer programming. In his first month, Clint worked on setting up a test server for a new ILS environment and enabled a more mobile-friendly version of the library's catalog while we wait for the completion of our new app.

OPAC Deployment

The IT team is updating the public OPACs around the library with a new chromebox setup. This will result in a few less OPACs around the library than we currently have. Usage statistics demonstrated that certain units remained largely unused and not worth the cost and upkeep. Implementation is currently rolling out.

Website Increase
