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CIRCULATION

PHYSICAL COLLECTIONS

Circulation in March dipped below prior year numbers for the first time since 2019. The lack of a mobile application is having a large impact on our library users, who demonstrate a preference for mobile technology. Our new app is slated to go live in May.





DIGITAL COLLECTIONS

Both online reading and database usage decreased over the prior month, despite the longer time period. Due to updates at the consortial level, we are analyzing our approach to eResources with item availability at the forefront. Costs for eBook and eAudiobooks are increasing rapidly, hold ratios are skyrocketing, and other libraries are pulling out of shared systems. We added a new analytics module to our catalog to help us learn more about our collection usage in anticipation that potential changes may be needed.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

- The youth department offered a reading incentive program to celebrate Reading Month in March.
 170 kids signed up for the challenge.
- Through a collaboration with MSU Extension, we are offering partner programs to our Seed and Plant Library. The first offering in March was about native plants. The next offering in April will be a hands-on workshop about seed-starting.
- The library continues to recruit and train participants for the Human Library event in May.
- Last-minute eclipse-viewers bombarded the library starting three days before the event. The library logged 75 phone calls within the first 10 minutes the library was open on 4/8, all related to eclipse glasses!

Community Relations Specialist, Heather Pacheco, and I met with an interdisciplinary team at PCCS to discuss the development of a field trip program sponsored by the BOSCH Community Fund. AARP Tax Support

Digital Signage

The library began testing a Yodeck player on the Teen Zone monitor to see how the system could work to support a new approach to digital signage throughout the library. This system includes a cost-effective content management software and is run through Raspberry Pi microcomputers.

UPS Replacement

After a power outage messed with the library's digital services, the IT team replaced a backup battery in one of our network closets, to ensure more seamless recovery after outages.

Custom Stat Collection Module

Our new programmer is developing a custom stat collection module to allow us to capture patron transactions more seamlessly and with more customization. The new module will allow us to easily pull data and visualize how patrons are interacting with staff throughout the library.

Teen Zone Upgrades

The IT team rewired the Teen Study Room to accommodate a new table with upgraded AV. They also removed the TV screen for painting and reinstalled it in the upgraded space.

Electrical Room Upgrades

The area surrounding the custodial water tub was upgraded after a crack in the old tub caused significant water damage. Tiles and baseboards were replaced with on-hand stock from our basement, showerboard was installed around the perimeter, and additional gaps throughout the room were filled with foam and sealant to protect against future damage.

Office Re-Keying

Five office doors were rekeyed so that all offices belonging to supervisory staff utilize the same key. Keys to administrative offices, where confidential information is secured, utilize a different key that is more limited among staff.

Teen Zone Painting

The Teen Zone underwent a full re-painting. Page staff removed all books to carts and replaced them after the project was completed ahead of schedule. Staff from across the library supported the transition, and we are thrilled with the new look and feel.

Book Display Ideas

Setting up small tables "bookstore style" with some books laid flat on the table.
"Recently Returned" Display - thought this could be useful for when we are short on pages but high on circulation in the summertime.

- Utilizing "voting boards" in displays! Have two topics on a board and kids can put stickers next to their favorite topic to "vote" for a winner. To minimize damage to the library, the stickers can be kept at the circulation desk for library staff to pass out. Thought this could be a great passive programming opportunity for summer reading, with a different "poll" each week. They also mentioned the results of these polls can be great ideas for programming.

- Bracket-Based voting - can change every week (e: best book characters, superheroes, magical creatures, etc.)

- Parenting Book Display

- Blind Date with a Book - definitely not a new idea, but they offered a new twist, to do it themed around "mood reading", a term I've definitely heard floating around the internet book sphere recently.

- Lift-the-flap interactive displays

- Staff and their pets display!

- Flow-chart book recommendations
- I Spy Display could be a great use of the glass cabinet.

- Includes yoga cards for regulating their systems
- "Calm Down Cubes"
- Dolls

- Cards with different emotions for children with autism / emotional perception difficulties
