
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

Custom Patron Interaction Tool

Our new Technology Specialist, Clint Lafferty, designed and implemented a new tool to help count patron interactions. This tool expands on our previous capabilities with better customizations and data visualization.

Security Camera Updates

PDL upgraded our vestibule security camera after the prior one stopped working. This camera is a serious upgrade. It can count individuals in a very accurate way, which will help improve our door count statistics. Current data collection is sensor-based, and cannot differentiate between groups and individuals. It has the potential to support security in a proactive way as well, as it includes facial-recognition software.

Lab Updates

The Lab added a few new pieces of storage furniture to help organize the heavily used space. Lab staff also moved around the furniture to enhance the flow of the space.

We are also excited to welcome the next group of Teen STEM Interns for the summer. Their presence will greatly expand the availability of the Lab.

Mobile App Updates

We are currently beta testing the library's new mobile application. Once the final issues with the app are addressed, we will submit the application to Apple and Google for publication in their stores. That process can take up to 2 weeks. Donna Jackson, our Marketing and Visual Design Specialist, has put together a public messaging campaign to launch in July.

Landscape Updates

The bulk of the Amphitheater updates were completed prior to the June 1 Ribbon Cutting. There are still about 100 plants that we are waiting for, as there were supply delays for the particular plants specified by the landscape design. After the seed mix that was spread in the fall didn't result in a successful lawn, we made the choice to update the project to include sod, which required additional last-minute costs.

Teams of vendors also weeded and mulched the entire grounds and power-washed the building exterior.

Outdoor Irrigation Update

We brought in Executive Property Maintenance to install and update the library's irrigation system for the entire property. A water main was broken during the demolition last fall in the Amphitheater, but it was repaired.

Painting Projects

Green Earth Coatings worked on remediated outdoor trim rot and touched up our outdoor columns. They also re-glazed our Main Street sign and put a fresh coat of paint on the Little Free Library.

Bike Fix-It Station and Seed Library

The Facility Team fixed the broken Bike Fix-It Station and installed a series of pegboards to support the display of the Seed/Plant Collection on the Upper Level.

LIBRARIES WITHOUT WALLS

Sarah Winter, Adult Librarian Sessions Attended Windows Narrator and Magnification OrCam Technologies Mastering Al Assistance Low-Tech Assistive Devices

What did you learn? How do you think this conference will influence your work going forward?

I learned so much about the different assistive technologies that are available for our low vision community. OrCam Technologies in particular is on the cutting edge of assistive tech and it's amazing to see all of those developments. The low-tech assistive devices session was also great as I've planned to add some library of things items, and it helped to hear from people with blindness and low vision which items were the most helpful. I plan on getting with Eric to go over Windows Narrator and Magnification-- this something that is free with our Windows technology and may be helpful to publicize on the UL computers. I don't think that our patrons on average are in need of Al assistance as it was relayed to me in that session, but it was interesting to learn about those advancements and where they are headed in assistive tech.

Anything we should consider implementing at PDL?

I want to explore funding for a circulating OrCam, I think it would be incredibly valuable for patrons to be able to check one out. I also think that Windows Narrator and Magnification is something we need to explore and offer to our patrons, though I will defer to Eric on that. If plans move forward for Low Vision Library of Things, I will pass my notes on to Sean from that session.
