



#### PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS



**Library Visits** 


Youth participation spiked, due to the popular weekly programs ongoing through the summer. We saw a dip in meeting room reservations, comparatively to average figures.

# COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

## PROJECT UPDATES

#### Farmer's Market

PDL staff are hosting booths at many of the Satuday Farmer's Markets. At the two events held in July, staff interacted with over 300 people. We have received positive feedback from the Chamber about our inclusion in the markets.

### Community Outreach

PDL staff walked in the 4<sup>th</sup> of July parade alongside the Book Bike (affectionately named "Mo Wheelems" by our youth librarians). The Penn Theatre also hosted the film *Butterfly in the Sky* at the Penn with attendance by library staff and a coordinating book display in the library.

#### **PARClife Collaboration**

Community Relations Specialist, Heather Pacheco hosted PARClife, a community-based support-provider for neurodivergent youth, for a tour of the library and individualized program.

#### **SRP Sponsorships**

During the summer, the library promotes our Summer Reading Sponsors in weekly social media posts. These posts have been getting more interaction and greater reach than our regular library content, thanks in part to our commitment to using video/reels. We appreciate the generosity of our community sponsors and are glad to see that we are pushing more community members to get to know local businesses through our program.





# TECHNOLOGY

## SPECIAL PROJECTS

### **Custom Staff Calendar Application**

Technology Specialist, Clint Lafferty, designed a better way to view shared calendars across library staff. This application is currently in beta testing and will allow for more transparency around availability.

## Crowdstrike Impacts

Preemptive maintenance by our IT team reduced the impact of the Crowdstrike outage in July. Only 3 PCs were impacted and no meaningful server issues were present.

#### Lab Updates

Youth-focused programming in the Lab has been a big hit this year, though the noise levels that result on the usually quiet upper level are a common complaint. 55 kids participated in the first session of Tinker Club.

## Mobile App Updates

The library's mobile application went live to the public on July 25. We are monitoring the impacts of the mobile application on our circulation as we move forward. Since launch, we have seen 1,109 downloads of the application and an average of 300 search queries per day.

# **FACILITIES**

### **Leak Updates**

RTU Humidifier drain blockage resulted in heavy water intrusion within the HVAC ductwork in part of the upper level that leaked down to the main level on July 12.

The situation was immediately triaged, and water contained/removed to prevent permanent damage to the library, equipment, rooftop, ceiling, furniture, and fixtures.

All emergency repair work and water remediation services were provided to the library by the service provider at no charge as a courtesy due to an overdue PM. All semiannual preventative maintenance was completed on both RTU's.

## **Library Closures**

The City of Plymouth conducted work on our shared parking lot that required the full shut off of the library's water supply on 7/20 and 7/22. The library closed to the public on both days, but we reopened in the evening on 7/22. Tremendous gratitude to library patrons and staff for their patience during the closures.

#### **Contract Renewals**

Facilities Coordinator, Loreen Graham, hosted onsite meetings for service contract renewal and cost savings opportunities with Robertson Morrison (HVAC Mechanicals), BASS (HVAC Control Provider), Guardian (Alarm System), Otis Elevator (Elevator Maintenance), and Specialized Vending (4-machines).
