

Circulation

Circulation of physical materials continued to follow postpandemic trends, as noted in the chart (*right*). Digital reading continues to grow, accounting for 20% of our overall checkouts.



Creating Opportunities for Connection and Growth

From book clubs to storytimes to big name author visits, PDL celebrated a culture of reading and learning throughout the year. The library continues to expand on it's mission of sharing resources to create even broader opportunities for connection and growth-- including through our popular makerspace and STEM programs in the Lab, our growing community swap programs that encourage sharing with neighbors, and our gaming events that help community members connect with each other on a personal level-- demonstrating our dedication to enriching lives, building connections, and fostering lifelong learning across a wide spectrum of topics and interests.



PROGRAM ATTENDANCE

Volunteers

Our volunteers are an incredible part of our library family, dedicating **3,116** hours this year to support our mission. From shelving books and assisting with programs to delivering materials to homebound seniors and so much more, their contributions make a tangible difference every day. We are deeply grateful for their generosity, enthusiasm, and unwavering commitment to serving our community.

The majority of our programs are aimed at supporting adult learners though we see higher attendance at youth events.

Community Engagement

This year, the library prioritized becoming a more visible and engaged presence in the community. Staff participated in numerous local events, including festivals, farmers' markets, and school outreach programs, to connect with residents and share library resources. Additionally, we enhanced our social media strategy and strengthened partnerships with local organizations, ensuring the library remained a trusted and accessible hub for everyone.

Service Highlights



WILCOX AMPHITHEATER GRAND OPENING

This year, we proudly unveiled the new Wilcox Amphitheater to an enthusiastic crowd of over 300 attendees. The amphitheater offers a versatile outdoor space for performances, programs, and community gatherings, marking a significant milestone in our commitment to enhancing cultural and recreational opportunities for our patrons.

CENTENNIAL GARDENS INSTALLATION

The installation of the Centennial Gardens transformed our library grounds into a fully native, pollinator-friendly landscape. This project not only celebrates sustainability and biodiversity but also provides an educational and serene space for visitors to learn about and enjoy Michigan's natural beauty.

TEEN STEM PROGRAM

We were thrilled to host another cohort of teen interns through our STEM programs, generously supported by the BOSCH Community Fund. These programs offered handson learning opportunities in science and technology, empowering teens with valuable skills and inspiring the next generation of innovators.

UPDATED CATALOG

This year, we launched a new public catalog powered by Bibliocommons software, designed to offer a more userfriendly and engaging experience. With intuitive search features, personalized recommendations, and enhanced interactivity, the new catalog is a game-changer for how our patrons discover and access library materials.

Next Steps

We continue to celebrate a culture of reading while investing in community aspirations.

Our strategic planning process identified three areas of we will be investing our attention over the next four years. These goals are outlined below along with specific activities that the library will undertake next year.

Foster connections between residents

In the coming year, we will be working on incorporating more intergenerational activities in our offerings. We are also launching a "Checkout an Expert" program to help community members grow their networks and highlight our individual experts.

Enhance communication and information sharing

We plan to expand on our role as information providers by prototyping a community-created newsletter for local news and curating more topical displays of resources in our building.

Contribute to the character of our community

Next year, we will undertake an interior renovation with more meeting spaces that highlight the historic charm of our downtown neighborhood.

Financials

Our accomplishments from this year reflect our commitment to growth, innovation, and service, and we look forward to building on this momentum in the year ahead.

This year, the library saw significant growth in its financial portfolio, marked by a notable increase in investment earnings, grants, and donations. These gains provided vital support for our operations and allowed us to move forward with several impactful projects. Among the most significant were the completion of the Wilcox Amphitheater and the Centennial Gardens, both of which enhance community engagement and sustainability on our grounds.

Looking ahead, we've laid the groundwork for transformative changes in the coming year. Plans are underway for major interior upgrades, including new furniture, paint, and carpeting, designed to create a more welcoming and functional space for patrons. Additionally, we've begun setting up staffing structures to support expanded weekend hours and the introduction of a new drive-thru service point in 2025, ensuring we continue to meet the evolving needs of our community.

This year also brought important updates to our financial processes, particularly in how we handle acquisitions. These changes streamline operations and provide greater transparency and efficiency, ensuring that we remain good stewards of public funds. With these financial and operational advancements, the library is well-positioned to continue delivering exceptional services while embracing innovation and growth.
