

# The Stories We Share at the Table



When we think of the holidays, we often think of the table. The dishes passed around, the scents that fill the air, the familiar recipes that feel like home. Holiday food is more than nourishment. It is memory, culture, and connection served on a plate. Every dish has a story. Pecan pie tells of Southern roots and the marriage of Indigenous ingredients with regional staples. Matzoh ball soup speaks of comfort and resilience in Jewish communities. Collard greens, tamales, fruitcakes, and latkes each remind us of where we have come from and offer a way to share those stories with others.

Food connects us in ways nothing else can. When we sit together and share a meal, we are opening the door to our histories. A plate of cookies or a bowl of soup can bridge differences, spark conversation, and bring people together in ways that words alone often cannot.

# Library Books Delivered with Care



As part of our outreach to the community, we have long had volunteers delivering books to residents of Plymouth's many senior living facilities as well as to the homes of those unable to visit the library due to a short-term or long-term condition.

We initially partnered with Plymouth Community Council on Aging to learn from their experience. In March of 2005, we served our first homebound individual, a blind gentleman who loved listening to audiobooks but didn't want his family to have to go to the trouble of getting them for him. Because of the Homebound Delivery Service, he listened to over 360 books.

That service continues today, and in the last year alone, Plymouth District Library delivered over 2,000 books to facilities and individuals.





#### GRAPHIC NOVEL BOOK CLUB
















The act of eating together slows us down. It gives us time to listen, to laugh, and to notice the details that make us who we are.

Across the world, holidays are marked by signature flavors that carry both joy and meaning.

Masala Sweet Rice (India, Diwali) Golden rice pudding scented with saffron and cardamom, a dish that symbolizes prosperity and celebration. Pastelitos de Guayaba (Caribbean and Latin America, Christmas season) Flaky pastries filled with guava and cream cheese, often shared at family gatherings alongside coffee or hot chocolate.

**Ma'amoul** (Middle East, Eid and Christmas) Delicate, shortbread-like cookies filled with dates, pistachios, or walnuts. They are often pressed into carved wooden molds that create intricate patterns on top, then dusted lightly with

powdered sugar. Ma'amoul is traditionally made in large batches before Eid and shared with family, neighbors, and guests as a gesture of hospitality and joy.

Matzoh Ball Soup (Jewish High Holidays and Passover) Soft dumplings floating in a warm broth, a dish that comforts and heals as much as it nourishes.

Pecan Pie (United States, Thanksgiving and Christmas) A rich, sweet Southern favorite that has found its way onto tables across the country, often served with whipped cream or ice cream. These are only glimpses of recipes that carry entire histories in their flavors. Each one represents a people, a place, and a memory worth passing down.

Cooking together is its own kind of tradition. Rolling dough, simmering soups, or waiting for a cake to rise are rituals of care. They are ways of saying "you belong here" without speaking the words.

Even when distance or circumstance keeps us apart, food helps us stay connected. A recipe shared through an email, a phone call with directions, or the familiar smell of a dish that reminds us of someone we love can bring comfort

across miles. The holidays are a perfect time to explore new recipes and rediscover old ones. You can find these cook books and more in our library non-fiction collection.

This season, let food tell your story. Borrow a cookbook, try something new, and share it with someone you love. In doing so, you keep traditions alive and create new ones of your own. Food is history. Food is comfort. And during the holidays, food is the gift that binds us together.

#### Homebound Book Delivery Service cont.

In addition to providing access to materials, this service provides a small dose of companionship to those who cannot get out. The monthly visits mean a great deal to our homebound patrons as evidenced by the number of calls, cards, and letters the library receives.

How does it work? A librarian interviews every new homebound participant to ensure that they are getting the right books in the right format (large print, audiobooks, etc.), and each month a volunteer delivers those books to the patron




